It has been a whirlwind of activity since installation in June. I want to take an opportunity to thank my chapter for a wonderful reception in early July. These ladies have been my DAR family for as long as I can remember, and I appreciate everything they did to make the event perfect. I attended the final audit of the Brunia administration in July. I was thrilled to represent Iowa at the 77th Annual Cathedral of the Pines event held in Rindge, New Hampshire in August. I enjoyed participating with ISDAR members in the Iowa State Fair Parade.

I was able to attend the Nancy McKay Harsh Chapter meeting in August for my first official chapter visit. I have upcoming visits scheduled for Nathaniel Fellows and Abigail Adams Chapters. Please reach out to me to schedule a visit for one of your chapter meetings over the next two years.

I want to thank those that were able to attend Fall Forum last week. I hope you found the event informative and fun. If you were unable to attend, the State Officers will be traveling to the SW and NE districts this fall; please join us at the SW District Meeting in Avoca on September 14 or at the NE District Meeting in Cedar Falls on November 9. Encourage your chapter members to go. It is especially informative for new officers and chairmen and new members, and it is a great way to get to know others in your district and share ideas. Please mark your calendars for State Conference April 3-5, 2025 and Fall Forum September 5-6, 2025.

I want to thank those in attendance at the Fall Forum for approving the 2024-2026 **State Regent's Project**. This project will be a three-tiered project to support education; on the local level, chapters are encouraged to adopt a classroom at an area school, on the state level, provide support for the ISDAR Scholarship Fund with a goal of \$7000, and on the national level, provide support for the Friends of Education Fund with a goal of \$3000. Funds will be raised through the sale of ISDAR logo clothing, star logo pins and pashminas. Voices will be sold for a quilt, patriotic table runner and placemats and an eagle cross-stitch. Donations are also accepted. Any member making a donation to the State Regent's project can designate it for the ISDAR Scholarship fund or the national Friends of Education Fund. Donations earmarked for the Friends of Education fund will be eligible for Heritage Club Credit through the Development Office.

Although Iowa will not be sponsoring a bus for Continental Congress in 2025 we have been invited to join the Illinois Bus. The trip will be approximately \$1500 for a double or \$2250 for a single. The bus will depart from Bloomington, IL at 11:00 am on June 22, with an overnight in Lexington and will arrive in Washington, D.C. on Monday afternoon. The bus will depart from Washington after installation and will arrive back in Bloomington on Monday June 30. If you are interested in more information, please let me know and I will connect you with the bus coordinator from Illinois. They are looking for reservations in the next couple of weeks with final payment due in March.

Each of you is an important member of your chapter and to the Iowa Society. I encourage everyone to consider participating in a manner that suits you as a person but also helps the chapter and local community. Each and every one of us has special gifts that will be beneficial to your chapter and the Iowa Society

I encourage all of you to dive into the Leadership Training Courses. This old dog learned some very valuable new tricks!




Dues renewal season doesn't have to take the sparkle from your sunny days.

# From the State Historian Barb MacDougall

**Hello Iowa Daughters!** Fall is around the corner so it's time to get busy exploring all the exciting possibilities for chapter work through the Office of the Historian General! Here is a brief overview:

Outstanding Teacher of American History Contest - This is to honor a full-time teacher of History, Social Studies, Government or Citizenship, teaching any grades from 5-12. Deadline to submit all required documentation to this officer is November 15th.

**DAR History Award Medal** - This is to honor an individual or group whose promotion of American history has significantly advanced the understanding of America's past. Nominations for this award are submitted electronically to the Office of the Historian General.



NSDAR Excellence in American History Book Award (for adult literature or children's literature) - This is to recognize an author for distinguished work that significantly preserves American history, specifically the Early Colonial Period (1607) through the Federalist Period (1801). The book can be historical non-fiction, biography or historically-accurate fiction. There are lists for both adult and children's books that are recommended for consideration on the National website. This might be a great way to start a Book Club in your chapter! This nomination is sent directly to the Historian General and the deadline is December 15th.

**DAR Historical or Commemorative Marker** - Is there an important event, building, person in your community that has not yet been recognized with a DAR marker? Your dossier goes directly to the Office of the Historian General.

**America 250! Patriot Marker** - This is to commemorate the 250th Anniversary of the United States. Advanced permission is obtained from the Office of the Historian General and a marker must be purchased from an approved vendor.

**DAR Insignia Grave Marker** - The Chapter Regent verifies the DAR membership and the form is sent to the Historian General. The signed permission form is then sent to an authorized firm to purchase the marker. After the grave is marked, a report form is sent to both the Historian General and the State Historian.

All of the forms for this office can be found by visiting the members site + resources + executive offices + Historian General. They can also be located in the National Information Packet.


#### Two of the choices relate back to our Eliza Hamilton book.


The British are Coming by Rick Atkinson is the first volume of a projected 3 volume series titled The Revolution Trilogy. It covers the first twenty-one months of the war for independence. This book has already won many prizes and has been a previous selection of the National DAR Library Book Club. The book is 776 pages long, but do not despair! There are 129 pages of notes and bibliographical references, maps, and illustrations.


Valcour: The 1776 Campaign That Saved the Cause of Liberty by Jack Kelly is on the list of books under consideration for the NSDAR Excellence in American History Book Award for 2025. It tells the story of one crucial battle of the Revolution which helped preserve the cause of liberty. Philip Schuyler, the father of Eliza Hamilton, plays a prominent role in this book.

The third selection, The Jewish World of Alexander Hamilton by Andrew Porwancher, explores the previously unexplored childhood of Alexander Hamilton in the Caribbean and how that background influenced his relationships with the Jewish community as an adult. This book is also under consideration for the NSDAR Excellence in American History Book Award.

The second meeting of the book club will be a virtual meeting on January 11, 2025, at 11:00 a.m. Our third book club meeting of the year will be held at Spring conference.

This American History Chair is excited to kick off the new school year highlighting the American History Contests & Awards.

The three DAR contests are The American History Essay Contest, The Patriots of the American Revolution DAR High School Essay Contest, grades 9 - 12, and NEW this year is The American History Video Contest.

We have two DAR Awards. The Excellence in American History DAR Award and The Women in American History Award.



The 3 American History Contests must only be submitted electronically this year.

**The American History Essay Contest's** title "Enjoying a new kind of Tea Party!" for grades 5-8, students are to imagine they are one of over 51 women who boldly participated in one of two Tea Parties who refused to buy tea from the British because of their high taxes and laws or burned their tea for the same reasons.

New this year to the contest lineup will be **The Video Contest**, grades 5-12. This contest will have the same title, "Enjoying a new kind of Tea Party!" Length: Up to 3 minutes. Check the ISDAR American History Committees web site, the DAR.org at The American History Committee/Forms, or ask your Regents who will provide to you, a letter she received to share.

The Tea Party theme for both contests is for boys also. They can pretend a family member attended the tea party.

In 2021, NSDAR established a new high school-level essay contest for grades 9-12, "DAR Patriots of the American Revolution High School Essay Contest". This contest focuses on figures of the American Revolution, in preparation for the 250th anniversary of the nation's founding. All contests are open to students in public, private, or parochial schools, or those who are home schooled and conducted without regard to race, religion, sex, or national origin.

The Excellence in American History DAR Award. (REMINDER THIS IS SEPARATE FROM THE ESSAY CONTESTS!!) There is a certification of award and a bronze medal to be awarded. The Chapter may determine eligibility and criteria for this award for any student in any grade.

**Women in American History** is a wonderful award. The electronic form is easy to download, save to your computer, fill out, add a 100-word essay, finish, attach the form with a picture to an email and send to me. Choose a woman to honor for this recognition by taking into consideration women who have contributed or made a difference in their communities. She could be a historical entity or currently alive and

worthy of recognition. An award winner for example: Jordan Chiles, of Women's Gymnastics was the DAR Women in American History Award recipient. Look for women who are, or have been, intellectual, educational, social, religious, political, scientific, or cultural innovators. Celebrate Stars & Stripes Forever! Members can educate themselves and the general public by promoting cultural activities and providing financial or material assistance to programs supported by the DAR. There are grants available for qualifying Native American projects.



Reach out into the community and participate in **American Heritage Month** (November).

**Obtain a proclamation** from your community. A writable form is available on the DAR American Indian Committee webpage and in the forms section.

**Share information about scholarships available** to Native American students with your chapter and in your community. The application process is entirely online through the Academic Works portal which is open November 1 through January 31 annually. American Indian Scholarships benefit Indian youth and are an important part of this committee's work. Chapters have numerous educational opportunities relating to this committee:

Help stop the spread of invasive species in your community

Invasive species, like emerald ash borer, Asian longhorned beetle, spongy moth and oriental bittersweet threaten Iowa's ecosystem by competing with and destroying native trees and disrupting the natural complex habitat system.

Iowa woodlands, wildlands and waterways draw hundreds of thousands of tourists and recreational users each year. Much of the spread of Invasive species comes from people simply enjoying nature. Uninvited guests can hitch a ride on outdoor gear, shoes and clothes, traveling hundreds of miles in a single day.

Take these easy steps to stop the spread of invasive species in your community.

- Verify that the plants you buy for your yard or garden are not invasive. Many non-native plants can become invasive. Find quick ID photos and common management techniques to control 19 invasive trees, shrubs and plants on the DNR webpage at iowadnr.gov/Conservation/Forestry/Forest-Health/Invasive-Plants
- Look for spongy moth egg masses on all outdoor equipment when traveling from a spongy moth quarantined area.
- Clean your boots before and after you hike in a new area to avoid spreading seeds. This is a common way garlic mustard and other plants are spread.
- Do not buy or sell firewood from outside your county. Firewood can contain emerald ash borer, Sirex woodwasp, Asian longhorned beetle, oak wilt and many more pests. Plenty of firewood is available locally near state and county parks. Make sure to burn all of the firewood at the campsite and not leave it or transport to a new area.
- Work with your private lands district forester for plans to make your forests more resilient to invasive species. Find contact information and forest landowner assistance resources online

### **DAR Scholarship Committee**

The purpose of the DAR Scholarship Committee is to share information about scholarships offered by both the National Society and the Iowa Society with your chapter and with schools in the communities you serve. Scholarship chairs publicize the scholarships by emailing or writing letters to your local school counselors. You can find out who the counselors are by Googling the name of a school system, clicking on the link for the high school and then looking for the names and addresses of the high school counselor.

The ISDAR website contains a sample letter for school counselors and posters advertising both Iowa Society and National Society scholarships. Be sure to edit the posters to include the name of your scholarship chair, contact information, and chapter name.

## **NSDAR Scholarships**

Each year the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution (NSDAR) awards multiple scholarships to students showing dedication to the pursuit of higher education in diverse areas of study. DAR's scholarships are awarded and judged without regard to gender, race, color, religion, national origin, or disability. Applicants must be citizens of the United States.

For detailed information, applicants should access the NSDAR website https://www.dar.org/national-society/scholarships. All applications are submitted using the online portal https://dar.academicworks.com which opens November 1 and closes January 31 each year.

The DAR Scholarship Committee does not process DAR Good Citizens, American Indian, or DAR School scholarships.

#### **ISDAR Scholarships**

The Iowa Society Daughters of the American Revolution awards two scholarships for graduating high school students who plan to attend a U.S. Department of Education accredited school of post-secondary education.

The two scholarships awarded by the Iowa Society are the ISDAR Scholarship and the Amelia Jenks Bloomer Scholarship. Each scholarship is \$1000. The criteria and the application process are the same for both scholarships. Your chapter may nominate only one student for each scholarship. You may nominate the same student for both scholarships if you wish.

The scholarship fund is intended to assist worthy young people to complete a higher education. The applicant must be an American citizen, an Iowa resident and be of good character.

Completed applications for Iowa Society scholarships are due to the Scholarship Chair by February 1st.

Iowa Society Daughters of the American Revolution Scholarship Application ISDAR Scholarship Fund Regulations Recommendation Adopted by the Executive committee, March 21, 2001 Amended April 23, 2022

I. OBJECT: This Scholarship Fund is intended to assist worthy young men and women to complete a higher education. They must be American citizens of good character and Iowa residents.

#### II. ELIGIBILITY:

- The applicant must be planning to attend a U.S. Department of Education accredited school of postsecondary education.
- He or she must have a minimum of a 3.0 grade point average based on a 4.0 scale, or equivalent.
- The scholarship shall be awarded based upon merit and financial need.
- Each Chapter is entitled to ONE nomination for the Scholarship. The Chapter's nomination advances on to the State level for judging. (Only the ISDAR Scholarship recipients will be notified.)
- The Chapter Regent must sign the application form of the advancing entry. (The Chapter may include a letter of endorsement with the applicant's entry.)
- The Chapter's complete entry, including all required enclosures, must be postmarked no later than FEBRUARY 1. Please note, separate mailings will not be considered. No records will be returned.
- Payment contingent on receipt by the State Scholarship Chairman of first semester transcript from postsecondary institution.
- Should the scholarship winner fail to provide a first semester transcript within 90 days of completion of said semester, the scholarship shall be withdrawn and awarded to the next best eligible candidate.

## What is a Parliamentarian's Role and Purpose?

Parliamentarians act as a facilitator for bylaws, a consultant to manage meetings, and a mentor for members on parliamentary procedure.



## What are Bylaws?

Bylaws set up the chapter and how it is to be run, as they establish the specific rules of guidance by which the group is to function.

## Why are Bylaws Important?

Bylaws not only govern function, but also clearly define the roles and responsibilities of officers, fees and dues, meeting times, etc. Bylaws are a chapter's map, outlining not only its purpose, but also the practical day-to-day details of how it will go about its business. Following bylaws ensures consistent and agreed-upon voting and decision-making procedures.

Knowledge of chapter bylaws is important for all members, and you might consider adding them to your chapter's yearbook. In addition, a Bylaws Committee is an important one as they will periodically meet to revise or amend chapter bylaws to adapt to your chapter's particular needs, and ensure the chapter stays in compliance with State and National updates.

Bylaws can save time trying to work out organizational complications, help define your mission or goals, and keep things running smoothly.

This section states, "Each Chapter may submit a copy of bylaws to the State Parliamentarian to ascertain if such bylaws comply with the National and State Bylaws." The CRRC-Community Resource and Referral Center located at the Des Moines VA Hospital provides care and assistance to homeless veterans or veterans at-risk of becoming homeless. Our Project would be providing shoeboxes filled with a travel size game, a cool looking notebook, a fun writing pen, a holiday mug or any kind of mug, hot chocolate, tea, snack crackers, nuts, sugar free candy, an ornament, crossword-word search books or any other little fun gifts that would fill a shoebox size box. found travel games at Walmart and Target. The CRRC wanted the Shoeboxes to be "true gifts", not necessities that they receive all year long. Some of these veterans never receive even one "real" holiday gift!! The CRRC does not want the boxes wrapped, so the plastic, clear shoe boxes found at Dollar Tree for \$1.25 are perfect for this project. So far, we have 20 shoeboxes pledged. We need a total of 50. **This is a fabulous project that you can take back to your Chapter and pledge a few Project Shoeboxes for our homeless veterans for the holidays.** The cost for each shoebox I have filled has been \$14-\$17. This project has been approved by the Des Moines VA Hospital VAVS Chief and follows the CRRC requests. If you are from another catchment area and would love to do Project Shoebox for the holidays other than the Des Moines VA, you can fill them with so many fun things for veterans. They can be delivered to nursing homes, hospitals, homeless shelters or CBOCs. Please be sure you receive permission from the facility and if they want something special in the gift box. 



The City of Cedar Rapids contributed a large ice vault to cool the water as the fountain stood in front of the U.S. Post Office.


In 1948, the fountain was moved for a street widening project and stored by the city. Sadly, it was "lost" for many years, until 1987, when members of Ashey Chapter launched a campaign to find the fountain. It was found and moved to The History Center (formerly the Linn County Historical Museum). Inside The History Center, we have a display which includes the original minutes of the meetings in 1899 as well as photos of the regents at the time of the organizing of the chapter.

## It's a Grand New Flag!

Chapter met to clean the Lewis and Clark Camp Site monument at Lewis and Clark State Park, Onawa, Iowa. It marks the second camping ground in Monona County of Lewis and Clark on their voyage



up the Missouri River in August of 1804 and was erected by the Iowa Society and Onawa Chapter in June of 1921.

During the cleaning it was observed that the flagpole had seen better days and was not being used. The monument also had a heavy chain around it that needed painting or removal.

With the permission of the park ranger, chapter member, Jennie McCartney, submitted a grant with the Monona County Community Partners Foundation to replace the flagpole and do some landscaping.



The grant was awarded, and the Chapter had a new flagpole with flag and a solar light kit installed. The light kit allows for continual display of the flag and relieves the park staff from raising it every day. The heavy chain was removed, and landscaping was done around the monument.

The improvements were completed by Memorial Day to welcome the summer visitors. It greatly enhances the appeal of the park as you first drive in and brings attention to the marker. The park ranger and staff were very appreciative!

#### Priscilla Alden Chapter Summer tours

The Priscilla Alden Chapter of DAR traveled to Albia, Iowa in **July** to **tour** and **conduct wreath laying ceremonies** at the **Welcome Home Soldier Monument** and **William Crocket's grave**, a Revolutionary War Patriot.

The **Welcome Home Soldier monument** is located on 7 acres of land on Highway 34 just west of Albia. Memorializing both the living and deceased, active duty, peacetime and wartime, and honorably discharged veterans; this monument showcases their service to their country. 100 American flags fly from poles to the right of the entrance.



William Crockett was born between 1749 and 1759 in Monroe County, Virginia. He enlisted in October 1777 as a private fourth class in the Fourth Battalion of Captain Philip Mathias' Company, a part of the Cumberland County, PA Militia. William came to Monroe County, Iowa Territory in 1844. Around the year 1850, he died and was buried two miles South of Albia. In 1926, Betty Zane DAR Chapter helped find the grave and move his body to Oakview Cemetery in Albia, Monroe County, Iowa.

The **August tour** was to Lake View Iowa to again conduct wreath laying ceremonies at the **Veteran's Memorial** and **the DAR George Washington Forest marker**. The day started with a tour of the Lake View Museum on the shore of Black Hawk Lake. The museum displays a train set with town buildings along with many pictures and stories of early settlers. The ladies then conducted a wreath laying ceremony at the Veteran's monument in Speaker's Park. After lunch a trip was made to Arrowhead Lake to lay a wreath at the DAR George Washington Forest marker. The marker was to be cleaned but a poison ivy plant was

guarding the stone.





In 1930 the DAR helped in the development of a DAR forest in 41 states. The George Washington Memorial Forest located at Lake View was the sixth in the nation and only one in Iowa. In February of 1932, the ISDAR Regent and other state officers held a program dedicating the forest of 110 acres along the shores of Black Hawk Lake in the memory of George Washington. In April of 1932, 20,000 more trees were added to the forest. The project was completed in August of 1932 when a native boulder was added to mark the location. A bronze plague was added to remind those passing by of the project.


#### Fort John DAR Historical Marker Re-dedication Ceremony:

Lyon (State Vide President) and Larry Hoelscher (Dubuque) from the Iowa Sons of




