DAR Genealogy Update

Starting this week, some members who have pending Supplementals will receive what we're calling "1st contact" letters. These will address the following: incorrect citations; lack of service/residence; and lack of a birth date for new (not established) Patriot ancestors. The status in e-Membership will reflect this with the notation "1st contact." These letters differ from Additional Information Requested (AIR) letters in that the member is given this opportunity to submit corrections before the final review process. Our hope is that by the time the genealogist reviews the lineage (page 2 of the application), the member will have provided the documentation needed for verification.

New member certificates (verified after Dec. 2023) have been ordered and will be mailed soon! Certificates have been redesigned for the America 250 celebration and have been reformatted to ensure inclusion of all name and Patriot information. Thank you for your patience; the certificates are worth the wait!

The word from the Insignia Department is that the GEP Supplementals bar will be available for purchase in late May.

Final Tips

Don't forget to underline important names, dates and places on the documents you submit with your Applications and Supplementals. When printing your Application, be sure to select the correct paper size, which is legal 8.5" x 14". You may need to adjust your printer settings for "Fit" on Macs or "Shrink to Fit" on PCs to maximize the print capabilities on your legal-sized, acid-free paper. **Check your spam/ junk folder for possible missing notifications and letters.**

Honorary State Regent, Marla Suter, recently discovered the origin of wearing pink in the most recent NSDAR publication, "The Blue Sash", which gives bios of every President General. The story of the wearing of the pink is below, and contiues to this day. ISDAR should continue this fun tradition in support and honor of our State Regent's and President General's now and going forward! Pull out your pink suit or dress. Better yet. Go Shopping!!!

Mrs. O'Byrne was not originally slated to run for President General. Grace Colglazier Marshall of South Carolina was running for the office when she suddenly passed away in April 1947. Although she was encouraged by the selected Marshall Associates, Mrs. O'Byrne was reluctant to replace her deceased friend on the ballot. Not sure if she would be successful as a last-minute replacement, Mrs. O'Byrne devised a plan to make herself memorable. Through the entire week of Congress she wore the same pink dress. The "Pink Dress Device," as it came to be known, made Mrs. O'Byrne vividly memorable as she defeated Mrs. Marjorie Anna Reese Manlove of New York. She was installed as President General at the 56th Continental Congress in May 1947.

The Iowa Society Daughters of the American Revolution offers two state scholarships to worthy young people planning to attend a U.S. Department of Education accredited school of post-secondary education.

Both the ISDAR Scholarship and the Amelia Jenks Bloomer Scholarship are awarded based on merit and financial need and are one-time scholarships of \$1000 each.

Judging criteria includes:

- 1. Does the applicant demonstrate strong academic ability? A 3.0 grade point average or higher is required.
- 2. Has the student shown strong leadership skills, family values and/or a spirit for volunteerism?
- 3. Does the applicant show potential for making a positive contribution to our society in the future?



The winner of the 2024 Amelia Jenks Bloomer Scholarship is Elsa Green from Valley Lutheran School in Cedar Falls sponsored by Cedar Falls Chapter, Deborah Crawford, Regent.

Elsa, who was home-schooled through her sophomore year of high school, has participated in choir, robotics team, and Science Club at Valley Lutheran. She has volunteered for Meals on Wheels, Cedar Bend Humane Society, and the Northeast Iowa Food Bank. Elsa is a member of the Thomas Overton Society of the Children of the American Revolution where she is the public relations chair. She plans to attend the University of Northern Iowa where she will major in biology.

Our 2024 ISDAR Scholarship Award recipient is Addilyn Danley from Murray High School. Addilyn was sponsored by Nancy McKay Harsh Chapter, Jane Briley, Scholarship Chair, and Janelle Morgan, Regent.

Addilyn has been active in volleyball, basketball, Future Health Professionals, Future Business Leaders of America, National Honor Society, and Student Council and has held leadership roles in these groups. A few details:

- ★ Applications need to be mailed early in order to have enough review time to meet the deadline.
- ★ Understand that applications with issues may not be verified in time.
- ★ All chapters meeting the initiatives will be recognized during the 134th Continental Congress. A certificate to the chapter will be given for each initiative. There will not be an award for competing both.
- ★ All chapters meeting the challenge will be listed on the Membership Committee website and posted in the Daughters' Online Community.

Is there an *anchor* in the Iowa Room? Do you have an *anchor* in your rooms?

The lowa Room represents a 1790's parlor in the Federalist style. The room is *anchored* with a stately two-piece corner cupboard! The cupboard's top section has glazed doors and triangle shaped shelves inside. Take notice of the large butterfly hinges on the doors. The lower section has two drawers and two doors.

The cupboard is made with cherry and yellow popular wood and was one of the first pieces of furniture acquired for the lowa Room. Thanks to the Elizabeth Ross Chapter (1934).

Various china pieces including teacups and saucers, teapots and cream pots, plates and bowls are displayed in the upper section and were donated by Iowa Daughters in the early years of the Iowa Room's long history.

A living room or parlor needs an *anchor* piece of furniture or an accent feature to create or instigate the room's total design. Thus, look around, I suspect we all have *anchors* in our homes!



This quote from one of the nomination letters sent to National DAR tells you her story:

"Elsie . . . exemplifies dedication, service, leadership and tenacity in reaching her goals. She comes from a family of service who are involved in the organization "Midwest Honor Flights". This organization raises funds and arranges trips for veterans to our Nation's Capitol to have one last flight – an Honor Flight – to see the monuments dedicated to all veterans. Elsie's older brother, Aaron, is the CEO of the organization and someone that Elsie looks up to. Elsie, at age 13, wanted to be involved as well and set a goal to raise \$50,000. If she was able to reach that goal, her brother told her a flight would be named in her honor. Elsie took that challenge to heart and began a thriving business baking and selling cupcakes. Within two years, she had baked and sold \$50,000 worth of cupcakes. Not satisfied with reaching that

tremendous goal, she set a new goal of \$85,000 which would allow her to independently sponsor 83 veterans on this important trip. Within no time, she had sold the required \$35,000 extra in cupcakes. At age 15, she went on the Flight #15 with those 83 veterans whose trip to Washington, DC was completely covered by her efforts. Elsie demonstrated good business skills and follow-through in reaching her goals."

Elsie Honors Mission 15 took off in May 2023. Her Eagle Scout project involves further fundraising and support of the Honor Flight program. We are all very proud of this deserving young lady!

One of his favorite activities is being a part of a unique program called the Football Stat Crew which records statistics in real time during games and enters them into a computer program (created by Jack) which calculates the analytics that are used by the coaches during half time and a more basic version that can be viewed by the fans after the game. He is active in his church, especially youth programs. He works in his community in the lawn care and snow removal business with his father. Jack plans to attend lowa State University and major in business analytics and hopes to work in sports analytics.

The DAR Good Citizens Program which began in 1934 aims to recognize high school seniors who demonstrate the four qualities of a good citizen, namely dependability, service, leadership, and patriotism. Selected by their teachers and peers, only one student per year may be honored as a school's DAR Good Citizen. The selected student then writes a two hour proctored essay which is judged to determine the chapter award winner.

This year's prompt was: "What are the civic responsibilities of a good citizen and why are these duties, activities and behaviors important to the shaping of the America you hope to experience?'

The Open Prairie Chapter, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution presented Sheriff Warren Wethington the DAR Distinguished Citizen Medal on April 13, 2024. The ceremony was held at the Cedar County Historical Museum in Tipton with over seventy people in attendance including: Past Vice President General NSDAR and Honorary State Regent ISDAR Susan Harris, Iowa State Senator Kerry Gruenhagen and Iowa State Representative Bobby Kaufman. Pilgrim Chapter rearranged their monthly meeting location and their members attended the award ceremony and then held their meeting after.

The DAR Distinguished Citizen Medal was the first ever presented in the 84 years that the Open Prairie Chapter has existed in Cedar County. Sheriff Wethington was nominated for the award because of his overwhelming honesty and integrity

while holding his department to a higher standard. Sheriff Wethington has fought against hiring law enforcement with Giglio files in Cedar County. If an arresting officer has a Giglio file, it is not something that is disclosed to the public but has to be disclosed in a trial. Giglio files are created when there is an issue with excessive force in an arrest or honesty and integrity with the Officer. In a trial situation, this may cause issues for the case. Sheriff Wethington is protecting integrity of the badge in Cedar County but also the Constitutional rights of those he arrests when he exposes these officers.

The award was presented in conjunction with the America 250! Celebration that will be observed by the organization from 2024-2026. While doing research for this award, it was discovered that the Sheriff has over fourteen Revolutionary War Patriots. Open Prairie Chapter wrote for and were awarded the Celebration grant to help with the framing of the award, the food, and a retractable sign that was used at the event and also will be used for upcoming celebrations in the county where there will be a booth set up.

In doing research for the award, it was also discovered that Sheriff Wethington's wife has a couple patriots in her family tree as well. She and her daughter will be looking at attending our next meeting. Also, with our press release in the newspaper, a prospective member reached out to us about joining. All press is good press!!!
