

ARTICLE VIII-IOWA STATE CONFERENCE

Section 5. The call for the State Conference shall be issued forty-five (45) days before the convening of said conference. This notice, created by the State Vice Regent, shall be part of the official mailing list utilized by the Iowa Society newsletter. (See Article VII, Section 2(h)).

Section 9. Regents and delegates shall be entitled to an alternate and the Chapter Regent is authorized to fill vacancies in the Chapter delegation from the elected alternates. Delegates and alternates to the <u>State</u> <u>Conference shall be elected each year no later than two months before the month in which State Conference is held.</u> (Since State Conference is held in April then a chapter shall elect delegates no later than the February meeting.) A list of the delegates and alternates, with the date of their election by the Chapter, shall be sent to the State Conference Chairman by the deadline as specified on the State Credentials Form.

If you do not meet in the winter months, please elect delegates and alternates at the last meeting held prior to the break in your calendar.

As stated above, a list of your chapter delegates and alternates, with the date of their election by the Chapter, shall be sent to Tiffany Hauptman, State Conference Chairman by **March 1, 2026.**

Psalm 118:24: "This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it."





Now that dues season is nearly finished, perhaps it is time to take stock of how your chapter is doing. The Annual Chapter checkup for chapters over 40 members is form CDC1000 and can be found in the National Information Packet. For smaller chapters, form CDRC1001, is a more appropriate indicator of your chapter's health.



Recruiting, revitalizing and retaining members is everyone's task, not just the officers or emembership chair. Communicate, but keep it timely as well as short and to the point. Find ways to engage the long-term members let them know they are valued and appreciated. Recognize and highlight members doing great things, not just DAR things, but perhaps their volunteer work in the community. Life happens and everyone cannot make it to every meeting, but building relationships paves the way to greater participation. Do you recognize members' strengths and skills that might be tapped for an activity or special project?

The Storage Administration has revamped the Membership Committee's information on the webpages. There are wonderful tools, resources and initiatives to help you grow your chapter. Check them out! Subscribe to the Membership Community or the Chapter Development Commission on the DOC, as great ideas and activities to engage all members are posted almost every day. The Cherry Blossom initiative is a great example. Perhaps chapter members subscribing to a DOC that interests them, could report back to the chapter information or fun and inclusive ideas and activities. Personally, the crafter in me loves the Red, White & Glue DOC!

Are you hearing from former members wishing to reinstate? The Organizing General's office sent out, on November 5th, email letters to anyone, inactive since 2007, reaffirming the value of maintaining DAR membership. The \$10 reinstatement fee will be paid by National, so only the current 2025-2026 remittance for your chapter will render them active again. Take advantage of ladies coming back and involve them quickly so they want stay on the roster in the future.

Have you asked your mother, sister, aunt, cousin, friend, neighbor or colleague if DAR might be right for them? Spread the word! Ask the Revolutionary Dames, it works!



Thanksgiving is my favorite holiday and a busy time of year for chapters and treasurers.

I was grateful for the opportunity to represent Iowa on October 2, 2025, at the 101st Dedication Day at Kate Duncan Smith DAR school. Iowa donated \$1513 to the school.

The state would like to thank each and every chapter that submitted their chapter contributions for 2025. They were due by November 20th in order to get national credit for the chapter donations to the DAR Magazine fund.



Membership dues are to be paid by December 1. According to our State Bylaws under Article IV Dues & Fees, Section 1c. A chapter whose dues have not been paid by December 1, shall be notified by the state treasurer that the chapter shall not be entitled to representation at the state conference.

I appreciate all the hard work chapters are doing to mitigate risk by implementing incorporation that is strongly advised by National. The liability of an incorporated organization is limited to the assets of the chapter provided the executive board and chapter members have acted consistent with their fiduciary responsibilities and the law. Without being incorporated, the personal assets of chapter officers and members may be at risk. Currently 12 chapters have been incorporated. We are a few chapters shy of our goal, to make 50% by April. Who will be next? Please reach out if you need further assistance.

This state treasurer is in the process of cleaning out files from 2000-2017. Below is a list of retention guidelines from National.

The following records should be retained for three years:

Bank statements and bank reconciliations

Cancelled checks for routine purchases/expenses

Expired insurance policies

Miscellaneous internal reports

The following records should be retained for seven years:

Invoices

Expense records

Expired contracts

Revenue records (dues, sales, etc.)

Ledgers used to prepare financial statements

The following records should be retained permanently:

Tax returns

Annual financial statements

Insurance records

Property records

Important legal correspondence

Minute books, including Secretary's Minutes which include annual Treasurer's Report Audit reports

Depreciation records

Cancelled checks for important payments, such as property purchases

SECOND REVIEWER REMINDER

As specified in the Genealogy Guidelines Part 2, page 47, applicants must have two independent DAR members review and verify that the application was prepared correctly.

Second Review Requirements for Member Applications.

Applicants must have two independent DAR members review and verify that the application was prepared correctly. It's important to note that a member cannot serve as a reviewer for her own application.

- 1. This does not replace the signatures of regents and registrars for applications.
- 2. The names of the reviewers need to be recorded on the bottom of page one, but they do not need to be signatures.
- 3. One of the reviewers should be the chapter registrar or chapter lineage research chair, if available.
- 4. Reviewers can be chapter members or members of the Lineage Research, Volunteer Genealogists, Application Task Force, or other trusted DAR members.
- 5. A reviewer's goal is to ensure that each submission is prepared per DAR Genealogy Guidelines before mailing. It is not a reviewer's job to verify the applicant's lineage back to the identified Patriot.

Hello Iowa Daughters! I have plenty of news to pass on to you - straight from a zoom meeting with Cynthia Addison, Historian General!

For DAR Historical or Commemorative Markers - you must have approval to *replace*, *or even move* a marker *whether or not the marker has the DAR insignia*. If your chapter is planning on applying to place or move a historical marker, it is highly recommended that



you allow ample time for approval - 6 months at a minimum. Hopefully it would not take this long, but National is receiving more and more of these requests, so it is hard to say just how many could become back-logged. DO NOT schedule a dedication date until permission is granted for this marker.

Another note about historical markers that is so important - QR codes on markers that are approved by the Office of the Historian General are *forbidden!*

As to DAR Insignia Grave Markers - if you are wishing to honor a past member in this way, know that she does *not* need to have been a member of DAR at the time of her death.





• The Anne Trevarthen Memorial Scholarship is a one-time scholarship presented each April to a high school senior who will be attending the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg. The scholarship amount is based on the annual return of the endowment and is administered by the college. Flooding, fish, and freshwater are all improving thanks to the collaborative work of Iowa's Nature Conservancy and their partners.

In 2008, days of heavy rain caused the Cedar River to flood, inundating downtown Cedar Rapids and displacing more than 18,000 residents.

No lives were lost in the disaster, but the flood illustrated the vulnerability of the second largest city in Iowa. The river crested at a record 31.12 feet, floodwaters swirled through more than 10 square miles of the city and firefighters used boats to rescue 423 people. An estimated 1,360 people ultimately lost their jobs.

Since that devastating deluge, the City of Cedar Rapids decided to proactively mitigate flood risk. They turned to The Nature Conservancy to help them diversify their protection strategies and make broad, landscape-scale changes to lessen the risk of future floods.



Every one of Rebecca Tanner's five sons eventually fought during the Revolutionary War. And sadly, every one of them perished.

Rebecca Tanner, a Mohegan from Montville, Connecticut, had two sons who fought in the Battle of Bunker Hill. The majority of Connecticut's Indigenous soldiers were from the Mohegan tribe. Despite the high emotional cost of war, most Indigenous people believed their contribution to American victory would improve their situation.

During the 1777 British occupation of Philadelphia, General Howe moved into a home across the street from the Darragh's. Soon after, he attempted to expand his headquarters into the Darragh house. With the aid of a second cousin who was serving in the British army, Lydia was able to convince Howe to permit the couple to remain in their home in exchange for allowing the British to use their parlor to meet in. Because they were pacifists, there was no suspicion that Lydia might be a spy. This allowed her to gather information about British activities, which her younger son passed along to her eldest son, Charles.

The Ashbow brothers (Samuel and John) enlisted in the American cause on May 10, 1775 and marched to Cambridge in Captain John Durkee's Company with Colonel Israel Putman's Regiment.


After crossing onto the Charlestown Peninsula on June 17, twenty-two year old John was assigned to guard the Rail Fence, the site of the first two assaults by British troops attempting to flank the Americans and take the earthen fort on Breed's Hill. The line at the fence held firm and drove back the Regulars, inflicting horrific casualties upon them. John fought at the site with his brother, Samuel.

On August 2, 1777, Two Kettles Together carried word into the countryside that the British and their Native allies were surrounding Patriot-held Fort Schuyler. On August 6, 1777, Two Kettles Together, Han Yerry and their son Cornelius fought bravely at the Battle of Oriskany. She stood tall, fighting with two pistols. When a musket ball went through Han

Yerry's wrist, Two Kettles loaded his gun for him so

he could continue fighting.

Chief Shenendoah was instrumental in the Oneidas' choice to side with the colonists during the Revolutionary War and ranks high among the Nation's most significant historical figures.

Shenendoah was a hero of the War for Independence, wampum keeper of the Nation and the inaugurator of government-to-government agreements. He was given the name of "the white man's friend" by his fellow Indians. Shenendoah signed two treaties with the federal government. The first treaty, the Veteran's Treaty, recognized the Oneidas' sacrifices and their help during the Revolutionary War. The second was the 1794 Canandaigua Treaty which recognized Oneida sovereignty, land rights and tax

According to Oneida oral tradition, Polly Cooper walked more than 400 miles from her home in Central New York to Valley Forge in the cruel winter and early spring of 1777-78 to help feed Gen. George Washington's starving

Desperate for food, starving soliders tried to eat the uncooked white corn Polly Cooper and her fellow Oneidas brought with them. They stopped them, knowing that if they ate the raw corn it would swell in their stomachs and kill them. Polly taught the soldiers how to properly prepare and cook the white corn. She stayed to continue helping the troops even after the other Oneidas departed for their homelands. After the war, the Colonial Army tried to pay Polly Cooper for her valiant service, but she refused, stating that it was her duty to help her friends in their time of need.

Historic Preservation Charllotte Janeczko, Chair

This State Committee Chair for Historic Preservation has been working closely with State Regent, Sarah Steinke, and State Vice Regent, Tiffany Hauptman, for the past several months on a project that we hope will excite and spur involvement in the ISDAR Chapters throughout the state. You may remember I mentioned this project in the Spring Newsletter. The story involved my husband and I taking an Iowa road trip to find the only DAR forest in Iowa located in Lake View, Iowa. I learned



about the George Washington Memorial Forest from the NSDAR Historic Site and Properties Database. Planted in around 1932 at the encouragement of then President General Sarah Robert, I wanted to see if there were any of the original pine trees still growing there. With the help of a young Department of Natural Resources agent, we located the large granite boulder bearing the commemorative plaque. Showing its age and difficult to reach, the boulder called out for improvement. The forest itself has changed over the years, but still exists and is open to the public in the area between Arrowhead Lake and Blackhawk Lake.

So began my determination to get the ISDAR to restore the boulder and make it more accessible. I have secured the permission and co-operation of the Iowa DNR and the Lake View Historical Society. A committee, pictured with this article, has met and is willing to move forward with additional plans to encourage tree planting initiatives within the chapters throughout the state. There is much to do including getting NSDAR to approve the relocation of the boulder. Funding resources need to be investigated, and chapter involvement secured. It has been suggested that the Conservation and America 250 committees be included in the project.

I will continue to get updated information out to the chapters, but it would help me considerably if chapters would contact me with names of members interested in joining this project. <u>Please email me at cjasa2025@gmail or call me at 515-314-9638</u>.




National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom Celebration

Woodland Cemetery in Des Moines was added to the National Park Service's Network to Freedom. The designation, celebrated during an Oct. 25 ceremony, featured the unveiling of a commemorative marker that recognizes the final resting place of 15 Underground Railroad freedom seekers and operatives. The Abigail Adams Chapter of NSDAR purchased the marker.

Our chapter has also placed an America 250th Patriot Plaque in the cemetery, June 2024 and led a campaign for Baby Hill Markers in 2017.

The National Park Service's Network to Freedom program honors, preserves and promotes the history of resistance to enslavement through escape and flight. There are more than 800 recognized Underground Railroad sites across the United States.

Regent Pat Barry was mistress of Ceremony. Woodland Cemetery was never a segregated cemetery and has more Civil War veterans of color than any other Iowa cemetery west of Keokuk according to Mr. Rowley.


We wrapped up hosting the American Revolution Experience Exhibit on October 24, 2025.


Our Chapter, the Algona Public Library & the Battlefield Trust were excited to have featured the American Revolution Experience at the

Shillings note, printed in Pennsylvania in 1775 by Hall and Sellers (Benjamin Franklin's printing business partners).

I believe the 16 shillings currency was given to my Patriot, my fourth great-grandfather William Fellows, and he gave it to his grandson who kept the currency inside of his own Bible, which was passed down through the family line. With my family's permission, I contacted the DAR Library who was interested in receiving the Shillings Note. If you can believe it, the currency is still in fairly good shape! 




The Onawa Chapter enjoyed a busy November meeting!


